




SAFE ARRIVAL PROGRAM

ILLNESS AT SCHOOL

To prevent the spread of Germs, we encourage all children to wash their hands frequently during the school day or use the hand sanitizers. If your child is not feeling well in the morning, please do not send him/her to school.

Normally, we call home to parents regarding an illness if a child has a fever or is throwing up.

Here are some helpful guidelines to consider when deciding whether to send your child to school.

It is advisable to keep your child at home if:

- he/she has been up during the night due to illness and, as a result, has not had adequate sleep
- your child has had a fever or was throwing up the night before
- he/she has gone home from school the day before with a fever or other illness
- he/she has an unidentified rash not yet seen by a physician
- your child may pass on an illness to another student.

The French Immersion program offered at Gordon Public School is open to all students in Year 2 (Senior) Kindergarten. If you want your child to develop a high proficiency and fluency in Canada's two official languages, French Immersion has a great deal to offer.

Active Travel Ideas for January

There's SNOW time to walk like the winter! With the cold air and snow, some parents and families may choose to drive their kids to school in lieu of engaging in active travel. But walking in the winter can be fun, as long as extra precautions are being taken.

Tips for a safe and comfortable winter walk include:

Clothing Tips

Keep hands, head and ears covered. Be sure hats and scarves don't block hearing or vision

Wear mittens; they keep hands warmer than gloves

Wear warm, waterproof boots with good treads for better traction on snow and ice

Carry umbrellas for those rainy days

Wear wool or insulating synthetic clothing to help retain body heat

Layer clothing and wear a coat that is waterproof or water resistant and deflects the wind

In extreme cold keep as much skin covered as possible

Beware if the temperature falls below -25 °C or if the wind chill is -28 °C or colder. This is when exposed skin freezes in only a few minutes.

Change wet clothes as soon as possible - tuck extra socks and mitts into backpacks

Keep wearing sunscreen - yes, you can still get a sun burn in winter

Walking Tips

On dark winter mornings make sure kids are visible to oncoming traffic with reflective tape or tags on jackets, backpacks, boots and umbrellas

Always walk on the sidewalk. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing oncoming cars and stay on the shoulder or very close to the curb

When crossing at crosswalks, wait until cars come to a complete stop before crossing. They may not be able to stop suddenly on icy roads.

Take care near large snow banks that obscure visibility for walkers and cars at street crossings

Stay away from snow ploughs or snow blowers. Blowing snow from these machines can reduce visibility and may include flying pieces of ice and gravel

INCLEMENT WEATHER

There may be times during the school year where inclement weather or other situations could cause transportation cancellations or school closures.

At times when student transportation has been cancelled and schools remain open, the decision of whether or not to have children in school on that day rests with the parent or guardian.

Should you decide not to send your child to school in the event that transportation is cancelled but schools remain open, or if your child is ill or late, please ensure that you report child's absence on Safe Arrival.

A key resource in any emergency is the DSBN Emergency Information form that you filled out at the beginning of the school year. Please let the school know of any changes in contact information or procedures you wish to be followed throughout the school year.

For secondary schools it may become necessary to cancel late buses. Notice will be provided via school announcements and on the websites and subscription features by 11:30 a.m.
